

Glenn Campus wins LEED status

Mount Vernon Presbyterian School's Glenn Campus has received Leadership in Energy and Environmental Development (LEED) Silver Certification from the U.S. Green Building Council.

"The awarding of LEED Silver Certification ... is a tremendous affirmation for all those involved in its design and construction," said Don Sasso, the Sandy Springs private school's assistant head of school. "The Mount Vernon board and administration were very forward-looking in the way they

approached the Glenn Campus expansion project, and this award certainly confirms their foresight."

The Glenn Campus was designed by Collins Cooper Carusi Architects and built by Winter Construction. The green features of the campus include bamboo flooring in the gymnasium, drought-tolerant ground cover and trees, a drip irrigation system, locally produced materials, and a geothermal ground loop system for heating and cooling.

Fulton school system selects future leaders

Four Sandy Springs educators are among 26 people Fulton County Schools chose as the first class of its Aspiring Leaders Program, known as Alpha.

Alpha is part of the school system's V2 Leadership Academy, a new initiative that aims to identify and train future leaders for the school system. The first component of the initiative was the Promising Principals Program, which welcomed 27 assistant principals earlier in the school year.

The Alpha participants from Sandy Springs schools are student support team facilitator and basketball coach Jennifer Cassidy and administrative assistant Dan Sarago of

Ridgeview Charter School, curriculum support teacher Arnetta Eady of High Point Elementary School, and science department chairwoman Rochelle Lofstrand of North Springs Charter High School.


"Participating in Alpha will provide opportunities to observe and interact with other leaders in Fulton County that will further prepare me to be an effective school leader for any school in the system," said Cassidy, a Sandy Springs resident. "I am grateful for the opportunity to participate in the program and to gain additional leadership training."

The school system received 144 applications for Alpha.

School sidewalks must wait

The City Council responded Feb. 17 with a 5-1 vote for a resolution stating a desire for the sidewalks to be on the west side of Lake Forrest Drive. Dist. 6 Councilwoman Karen Meinzen McEnery voted against the motion, which marks the first time the council has deviated from its policy of not interfering with the Public Works Department's judgment.

McEnery joined a unanimous motion adopting a resolution asking the Board of Zoning Appeals to reconsider within 30 days.

The city has spent "in excess of \$100,000" designing the sidewalks, Dist. 3 Councilman Rusty Paul said. "We've got a flaw in our process in that we've got an appointed board that can override a decision of the City Council."

Susan Yeosock of the Lake Forrest Summit Community Association told the Board of Zoning Appeals that under the planned side-

have to seize more than one property for grading work to put sidewalks on the east side.

McEnery, who represents the neighborhood, said she attended the Board of Zoning Appeals meeting by invitation. Fulton County Board of Education member Gail Dean wrote McEnery a letter urging the city to consider sidewalks on Allen Road instead of Lake Forrest Drive.

"I'm here because of a safety issue, and I do think a less intrusive crossing could occur on the south side of Allen Road using the sidewalk there," McEnery said.

Some council members criticized her for appearing at the zoning meeting.

Paul said members have "an obligation to abide by the final decision of this council." He said he was "extremely disappointed" McEnery would "try to undermine this."

The council had never voted on which side

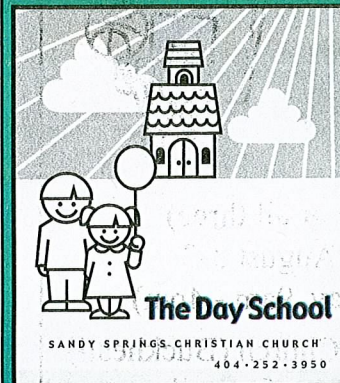
